Does Advocacy Work?

- YES!!!
- Congress is receptive
 - compelling, well-presented arguments
- Legislators will respond
 - constituent concerns
 - no substitute for direct contacts
- Communities matter
 - leverage influence
 - coordinated activity



Get Involved!

- Join the CRA Advocacy Network
 - support increased IT funding
 - write letters, make telephone calls

- Visit Capitol Hill
 - Share information about IT's importance

- Share information with your colleagues
 - email, word of mouth, ...



What Can You Do?

- Write your legislators
 - ask your colleagues to co-sign
- Visit your legislators' offices
 - Washington and local district offices
- Attend your legislators' town meetings
 - ask them to address science issues



What Can You Do?

- Invite your legislators to campus
 - tour the facilities
 - speak to faculty
 - discuss research, education, and workforce
- Work with your institution
 - cultivate local, grassroots networks
 - educate others about federal support

Cardinal Congressional Rules

- Frame arguments carefully
 - national and public interest
- Understand the legislative process
 - recognize that you are part of it
- Get to know your legislators and interests
 - cultivate friendships
 - become an ally
- Be specific, forthright, and honest
 - legislators expect it
